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Adult Protection Level 2 (Practitioners Role)

Abuse is a violation of an individual's human and civil rights, by any other person or persons.

Abuse may be perpetrated as the result of deliberate intent, negligence or ignorance.

Target Audience

For supervisors of staff who work with people aged 18 and over, and who is or may be in need of care services by reason of impairment, disability, age or illness, and who may be unable to take care of him or herself, or unable to protect him or herself against significant harm or exploitation.

Dealing with disclosure for those who need to complete the alert form as part of their professional role.

Determining risk, vulnerability and seriousness; examining the implications of the three 'Cs' (capacity, consent and confidentiality).

Aims
